Dear Friends,

We are excited to report that the Laguna de Santa Rosa has been named a Wetland of International Importance by the Ramsar Convention. We achieved this recognition on the 40th Anniversary of the signing of the Convention on Wetlands which was signed in Ramsar, Iran. A celebration and awarding of certificates to landowners included in the designation was held at the lovely Lynmar Estate winery overlooking the Laguna. Attendees included a "who's who" of elected officials including Congresswoman Lynn Woolsey, and other State and Local representatives too numerous to list here. Other attendees included State and local Agency representatives. These important partners of the Laguna Foundation all realize the importance of the Laguna de Santa Rosa ecosystem and were happy to celebrate the broadening and deepening of the Laguna that this designation represents.

Many of the organizations that came to the Ramsar celebration are also involved in a collaborative effort that was launched at the Laguna Foundation's State of the Laguna Conference in the fall of 2009 that dealt with adapting to climate change. Scientists agree that current levels of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere are enough to cause significant climate change even if we stopped the emissions today. The North Bay Climate Adaptation Initiative has the goal of developing and implementing effective climate adaptation strategies that sustain ecological and human communities of North San Francisco Bay watersheds. Our partners in this critical initiative include Sonoma Land Trust, Sonoma Ecology Center, Pepperwood Preserve, Audubon Canyon Ranch, Sonoma County Agricultural Preservation and Open Space District, California Coastal Commission, Sonoma County Water Agency and others.

We have much to do to further our mission to preserve, protect, restore and educate the public about the Laguna ecosystem and are really looking forward to the construction and opening of the Laguna Learning Center during the 2011 calendar year. This Center will be a place for the public to visit to learn more about the Laguna, a place to bring classes of children, the location for our docent education classes and so much more. Funding for this project came from the State Coastal Conservancy through Proposition 50 bond funding for nature learning facilities.

Thanks so much to everyone who supported and partnered with us in 2009-2010.

The Laguna de Santa Rosa: A Wetland of International Importance

The Laguna is a Wetland of International Importance! In 1971 the Ramsar Treaty recognized the importance of wetlands and created the international Ramsar Convention. This organization provides the framework for national action and international cooperation for the conservation and wise use of wetlands and their resources.

There are only five of these Wetlands of International Importance in the State of California and the Laguna is the only one north of Marin County. This incredible natural resource is a 14 mile long wetland complex stretching from Cotati to Forestville, where it empties into the Russian River. Draining a 254-square mile watershed that embraces the entire Santa Rosa Plain, the Laguna's wetlands and surrounding upland areas are home to a breathtaking range of wildlife including over two hundred species of birds and numerous other aquatic and terrestrial species including the endangered California Tiger Salamander.

Our mission at The Laguna Foundation is to preserve, protect, restore, and educate the public about this magnificent natural resource. We achieve this mission through the generous support of all of our supporters and with the expert management of our three Departments: Restoration, Environmental Education and Conservation Science. To achieve our mission, we also partner with a wide variety of fellow non-profits and various local, state and federal governmental agencies.




